A Message from BAiP President, Marjorie Goldsmith

As we approach the spring, I'm reminded how grateful I am to BAiP for providing many opportunities for me to connect with other members over the past winter. We've had interesting and entertaining programs from BAiP Presents. My knitting group has met on Zoom and, though we can't touch each other's yarn and projects, we've kept in touch through the winter, indeed for the past two Covid years. Hurray for Hollywood, book groups, and discussion groups of all kinds have continued, thanks to their many members and leaders and Zoom squad members.

At its March 10, 2022 meeting, the BAiP board voted to lift the mask requirement for in-person meetings. Individual fully vaccinated groups may choose to meet in person, on Zoom, or a hybrid of both, with or without masks. This is an opportunity to discuss what is best for you. The Board's statement follows.

BAiP is an all-volunteer organization. Members take care of the small and large details necessary for BAiP to operate. From filing documents in Dropbox or picking up mail at the post office, to working with other board members on policy issues, to planning BAiP Presents programming, a volunteer member takes responsibility for the task. We're looking for people to take on some additional administrative tasks and see that BAiP stays strong and available to our Upper West Side community. BAiP Board Approved Mask Policy

BAiP members are responsible for deciding whether masked or unmasked indoor in-person activities and volunteering is appropriate for them. If necessary, members should consult a medical professional to help make that determination. It is the responsibility of each group and volunteer leader, in collaboration with their group members, to decide whether to continue to meet on Zoom, hold in-person meetings, or have hybrid meetings with some in-person and some on Zoom.

Antiques Zoomshow Draws Record Audience by Dorothy Callaci

There were personal stories behind each of the 157 antiques items submitted by 57 BAiP members to the recent BAiP Zoomshow along with fascinating historical and cultural details provided about each item by antique experts.

Lynn and Steve Max said they were "excited to see their antique pocket watch appear on the show" and to learn it was a gentleman's hunting case pocket watch from the 1820s with a complex chronograph Suisse movement of gears for greater accuracy.

Lynn noted that "As a young man, Steve actually wore the watch...an unusual fashion statement at the time."

The Doyle Auction Gallery provided the antique experts who chose 13 of the submitted items to focus on for the Zoom presentation and provided written appraisals for all the others. Their stories and details of each item were enjoyed by a record participation of more than 130 BAIP viewers.

Among the wide range of antiques featured was Gil Tauber's beautiful 110-piece porcelain dinner service for 18 that was said to be from the Royal Porcelain factory in Austria in 1907. But, as the expert noted, dinner parties and dining tables today are not designed for 18 guests.

Antiques Zoomshow continued

"My daughter and granddaughter love looking at the delicate porcelain," Gil said, "But neither has any desire to own it because it can't be put in the dishwasher. The porcelain was inherited by my late wife who taught dance at SUNY, and it was used at every Thanksgiving. Washing was never a problem because the foreign students she invited always volunteered to help with the dishes."

The Doyle experts were specialists in everything from rare books and paintings to Asian artifacts, jewelry and more. The furniture specialist described Stan Weiss' coffee table as a 1950s Vladimir Kagan design made of walnut and brass with glass mosaic tiles that was "chic then and is chic now."

Stan said, "I was pleased with Doyle's research of my beloved cocktail table and happy to share it with the BAiP community."

Throughout the show, the experts advised all BAiP members who own antiques about the importance of writing down and saving documentation about the provenance of their valuables. In a Q&A at the end of the Zoom show, Dorothy Crouch read some of the questions submitted by members about care of valuables. If it's meant to shine, polish it. However, the experts warned: do not clean furniture, simply wipe it with a cloth. As for papers, textiles, and other delicate items, keep them out of the sun.

Susie Saunders Wolfe described having "emotional feelings in revisiting my grandfather's letters with an expert who could validate his pioneering role in early aviation history," adding, "I want to thank BAiP for all the work that went into creating such a fascinating program."

It took the significant efforts of a number of BAiP members to make the February 24 Zoomshow happen. Roses Katz and Gil Tauber connected the individual antique owners with the Doyle Gallery personnel. David Reich was chief troubleshooter and set up the Dropbox. The critical and complex arrangements for handoffs, screen sharing, and the audio/visual quality of the show were managed by Lo-Yi Chan. Marlene Schonbrun photographed most of the items seen on screen.

The Zoomshow was a wonderful example of many members volunteering their time and skills at multiple levels to create an exciting event for the community.





BAiP Member Profile: Miriam Rakowski

The crocuses are in full bloom and visiting birds on their way to summer homes fill the branches of the trees in Central Park. That means BAiP's resident ornithologist Miriam Rakowski is ready to resume her bird watching expeditions to the park for BAiP members.

Join her*** with your binoculars on her weekly morning expeditions and learn how to spot and identify all the varieties of birds who stop by each spring and fall, on their migratory journeys.

During 30 years of bird-watching around the world, Miriam has recorded sightings of 2,000 species. Her "exciting adventures" have included spotting rare tropical birds in the Amazon jungle. "I bird watch all year long," she explained, "and it has so greatly enriched my life that I have been inspired to share my passion with others."

The bird-watching expeditions she leads for BAiP and many other organizations are all in Central Park. That Eastern flyway is considered one of the 10 best places in the country to experience great bird migrations in the spring and fall. But for her own excursions, Miriam also enjoys a variety of Long Island locations, including Jones Beach and Montauk. "I go wherever interesting birds may turn up and my buddies can drive to," she said.

Back from a recent excursion to Montauk, she noted the very evident decline in numbers and varieties of birds which she also finds here in Central Park and which the Audubon Society attributes to loss of habitat and climate change. "But there are still plenty to be seen," she noted reassuringly, citing a glimpse recently of a rare slatey-backed gull, a Russian bird sometimes found in Alaska. "There are surprises all the time."

Miriam, born in Belgium but raised in Brooklyn, earned her first degree at Hunter College followed by a master's in international business at New York University. But after years in finance, Miriam wanted to do "something more meaningful with my life." Another degree prepared her for a second career as a public school math teacher and coach.

"I loved being around children," she said, "and took all my classes birding. We did social studies birding, science birding, and story birding."

It all began with a park ranger-led walk In Central Park 30 years ago. "I discovered it was a nice way to relax and to spend time with nice people. Slowly the birds seduced me," she said. "It's been a great gift during Covid and my way of coping."

Wearing comfortable shoes and armed with water and binoculars, which she very patiently helps each person adjust, the bird-watchers assemble on the outskirts of the park at 8 a.m. in the spring and 9 a.m. in winter when the birds are most active. The leisurely walks, usually covering one to two miles, are on flat terrain and include the forested areas, the park's seven bodies of water, and the meadows and gardens where the 300 species of birds that migrate through the park hang out.

Miriam is quick to point out the added benefits provided by the bird walks — fresh air, healthy exercise, and the chance to "de-stress." She also notes that the size of bird groups has to be small to be effective and that interest in birding has "exploded" during the pandemic. So, if you are interested in being part of a birding group sign up through BAiP and learn all the details of the weekly walks.

"Not only do we have the pleasure of viewing the many tropical birds that visit our park," she explains," we do so while strolling through beautiful and varied habitat surrounded by the sounds, smells and sights of nature that change through the seasons."
